The Course

This world-leading three-year degree course, which includes the opportunity to deepen focus in one of four elective pathways, is designed to develop versatile artists with all the tools and skills needed for a prolific career in dance and the creative industries.

The course is a highly intensive and diversified course, with a wide range of practical studio-based classes, enhanced by a range of contextual studies that directly relate to the experience of performing, making, researching, and understanding dance. You also have access to unique performance and artistic avenues throughout the course, including various opportunities to engage with the wider Place network.

Year 1 (BA1)

The first year offers all students to achieve a thorough grounding in daily physical practice. You will be introduced to various dance and movement practices and will continually expand your technical expertise and creative practices through daily classes. You will have classes in Dance Science and Psychology to support your understanding of safe dance practice and wellbeing. You will also be introduced to dance teaching and arts administration / producing skills.

Year 2 (BA2)

In your second year you will begin deepening focus in your chosen pathway through elective units. Centrally all students will encounter in-house and external dance practitioners and artists who invite you to engage with the wider art form and situate your practices within various contexts. You will develop collaborative skills within dance but also more broadly across other art forms and digital media through collaborations with external partners. Technical skills are further embodied through the daily practices. You will also develop an understanding of the role of dance in the community by participating in co-creative artistic processes led by experienced community dance artists working with a range of participants.

Year 3 (BA3)

The culmination of your development across the course is supported in the final year through the creation of professional portfolios, CVs, showreels and other relevant materials. In this final year, you will also conduct independent research through the creation and development of a year-long project. You are also offered numerous opportunities to work on professional performance industry projects with diverse, sector-leading professionals (choreographers, dance artists, directors, film makers, digital artists, dramaturgs, producers, community artists etc) in a wide variety of contexts in order to hone your chosen pathway further, taking on the different roles of performer, choreographer, educator or producer.

Optional Placement Sandwich Year

You will also the opportunity to undertake a yearlong sandwich placement year, for which you will be awarded a Diploma in Professional Studies. The placement year will take place in between Year 2 and Year 3 of the course.

You will have the opportunity to complete a placement in industry of at least 100 days / 20 weeks duration, either as one placement, or split across five placements.

Students who opt to do the placement will be able to experience the pace, atmosphere and discipline of working within their chosen area, giving practical experience of the roles, functions and operations of the area of the industry they may wish to enter.

What You Will Study

All students will study eight core units alongside two elective units, which you will select in your second year.



Admissions Process

Admissions Process

You will be required to complete an application form via The Place website. You will then be invited to attend an Admissions Workshop (either in person or online), alongside an interview with the panel.

Selection criteria

- Ability to engage in creative processes, demonstrating imagination, resourcefulness and communication skills
- Understanding of dance in its wider context, i.e. awareness of critical issues relevant to specific dance practices
- Potential for development of technical capabilities and performance skills
- Awareness of career prospects in dance and the creative industries

Admissions onto the different course pathways

Places onto the pathways leading to a bracketed degree title are discussed through the admissions process. Tasks to assess suitability for the individual pathways are embedded within the Admissions Workshop and Interview.

It may be possible for you to delay choosing your pathway or to make changes to the pathway you are on until mid BA2, subject to engagement in the learning process and achievement in prior units, and whether there are places available on the pathway.

In order to be eligible for the bracketed degree title, you must complete the required elective units, placements and/or professional roles on collaborative, for example:

- 2 electives (BA2), plus professional role in at least 2 out of 3 multidisciplinary projects (BA3) or
- 1 elective (BA2), plus placement in professional role (sandwich year), plus professional role in at least 2 out of 3 multidisciplinary projects (BA3)



Entry Requirements

Dance Training

Potential students will have experience in contemporary dance and/or other dance forms, such as hip hop and associated styles, ballet, South Asian dance practices, and dances of the African diaspora. You may experience dance as a medium to express yourself and as a creative outlet. You also may have taken Dance at GCSE or A-Level or BTEC, or an equivalent overseas qualification. You are seriously considering a career in the dance and creative industries.

How You Will Learn

The key modes of learning and teaching centre around the following:

- Daily practical, studio-based classes in a variety of dance practices
- Workshops with professional practitioners and artists
- A range of seminars and lectures
- Independent learning through self-reflective practice
- Research- and enquiry-based learning
- Project-based learning to enable you to take part in and lead creative and collaborative processes in a professional setting.

Your Hours

Your hours of study will be split across three, 12 week terms each year.

You will typically have on average 23 hours a week of face to face learning activity, which includes a mixture of practical classes, workshops and lectures/seminars. Your timetabled hours will vary throughout the course depending on the different projects you will be working on.

Assessment Methods

The course will increasingly favour holistic assessments throughout the course. Assessment methods will include:

- Portfolios of creative process and outcomes
- Blogs/vlogs
- Documentation of creative practice
- Lecture Demonstrations
- Films and Observations of embodied practice

Staff Teaching on the Course

You will be taught by exceptional teachers (many of whom are also practicing artists) and will includes Lecturers in Dance, Choreography and Improvisation, Contextual Studies, and Design. You will also work with a range of professional artists throughout the course on various projects. You may also have

the opportunity to work with creative industry's leading organisations such as Wimbledon School of Art, Guildhall School of Music and Drama, National Centre for Circus Arts, Sadler's Wells and Central St Martins.

Tuition Fee Deposit

Students paying overseas fees	Will need to pay a deposit of £1500 within 21 days of the date of the offer, in order to secure a place.		
UK Students not obtaining a UK tuition fee loan	The Tuition Fee Deposit is held against payment of tuition fees and is not normally refundable, except within the 14-day cooling off period from accepting offer.		
UK students who will be applying for a UK Tuition Fee Loan	You will not need to pay the deposit fee, all other terms and conditions remain the same.		

Other extra costs

Other extra costs may include:

- The cost of your dance clothing over three years
- Trainers for use in the studio
- Travel costs for curricular activities which take place off site. This might include performances and work in the community or in schools. (LCDS will cover the cost of any travel for events outside of London)
- The cost of materials which you may choose to use in your creative projects
- Printing costs
- The cost of books that you might wish to purchase (there is a well stocked Library on site at LCDS, but you may wish to consider purchasing your own additional books as well).
- The cost of a computer and broadband for online learning

Student Support Package

London Contemporary Dance School also offers a Student Support Package for an annual fee of £50, payable on registration / re-registration at the start of each academic year. More information can be found on **our website**.

Student Visa

Currently a student visa costs £490 if applied for outside the UK. Students will also need to pay the Immigration Surcharge, students will receive a 25% discount, and the discounted rate for student visa holders is currently £776 per year. Find out more about the **Student Visa here**.

Enhanced DBS Check

The BA course includes regulated activity and due to this an enhanced DBS check will need to be undertaken during the first year of study. The DBS check will be administered and paid for by LCDS.

Where it is determined that the results of the check would prevent you from being able to undertake the required regulated activity, LCDS will meet with you to discuss the alternative options available.
